Module I Moots

The following instructions shall apply in this regard:

1. A total of 2 moot propositions shall be made available for the students. The moot problems shall be one civil and one criminal. 2. Students are required to prepare written memorials for both the moot propositions. 3. The moot memorials shall consist of the following on behalf of both the sides: a. Issues b. Arguments based on the factual matrix and the applicable laws and rules c. Relevant and Applicable Case Laws d. Prayers Clause

The memorial for each case shall not exceed 15 pages.

Thus total number of pages of the journal for the Module 1 shall not be less than 20 and shall not exceed 30.

Civil Moot Court Problem
Sachin v/s. Manish

Manish and Sachin were long standing acquaintances who regularly had business dealings with one another. On 1st November, 2022, Manish, from his home address in Hyderabad, wrote to Sachin at his address in Pune, offering to sell him his Hyundai Verna car, (which he has long admired), for Rupees 5,00,000 and that the offer to remain open until 6th November, 2022.

On receiving the offer on 2nd November, Sachin left Pune on a business trip to Lucknow. On



the 2nd of November, Manish sold the car to Kaushik, who lives in Mumbai. On the very same day, Manish posted a letter to Sachin clearly indicating a revocation of his offer. This letter was delivered to Sachin's Pune address on 3rd November. On 4th November, Sachin posted an acceptance of the offer from Lucknow, addressed to Manish at his business address, (which was the address from which Manish usually conducted dealings with Sachin) in Karve Nagar, Pune. It was delivered there on 5th November but as Manish was absent from his office on that day, it wasn't read by him until 6th November, 2022. On 7th November, 2022 Sachin returned home and read the letter of revocation. Sachin filed a suit in the civil court claiming that a contract had been formed between himself and Manish, because he had accepted the offer either on 4th November through the application of the postal acceptance or on the 5th November when the letter was delivered to Manish's place of business. He claimed that both these events took place before the offer lapsed and before Manish's letter of revocation was communicated to him. Hence, Sachin claimed that Manish's act of selling the car to Kaushik was in breach of the contract.

Criminal Moot Problem

State of Madhya Pradesh v. Rohan Prakash Sharma

Rohan (Accused) and Mita (victim) were working together in a private company. Mita belonged to an affluent family whereas the financial position of Rohan was average. Eventually both fell in love with each other and then they married each other in 2017. After some time, the attitude of Rohit became harsh towards Mita. He started making demands of money from her. He also started putting pressure upon her to ask her parents to purchase a bungalow in the city for them. After some time, he also started asking her to fetch a share for him in the property of her father. Mita did not accept the unjustified demands of Rohan. Later, there were constant verbal altercations between the two. With passage of time, Mita's attitude also changed and she stopped taking care of Rohan and eventually, their altercations took physical form and both started physically abusing each other. On 19 November, 2020, at about 11 pm, a quarrel started between Rohan and Mita. As a shoe and a bottle were hurled by Mita against Rohan, the latter in retaliation and in a fit of rage, threw a heavy statue of metal at Mita, which struck at her head, making her fall unconscious. Rohan took her to the hospital where she was admitted to I.C.U. However, with a great difficulty her life was saved. By the dawn of the next day, a FIR was registered at the nearest police station by Suresh, the cousin brother of Mita. The charges were framed against Rohan under Section 307 r/w Section 498A of the Indian Penal Code, 1890. After a full-fledged trial before the Court of Session, Rohan was acquitted in the May 2024. The State moved the Madhya Pradesh High Court against the acquittal.

Module II Observance of Trial Proceedings

The following instructions shall apply in this regard:

1. Students shall be required to attend minimum two trial proceedings, one civil trial and one criminal trial at any court.
2. The student shall make a clear noting of the following details of the trial proceedings of both civil and criminal trials a. The name of the Court b. Brief note on the jurisdiction of the court c. Name and Designation of the Presiding Officer d. Names of the parties to the matter e. Brief



note on the factual matrix of the case f. Relevant and applicable legislations g. Stage at which the trial was ongoing h. A brief note on the court proceedings and the observations of the Court

3. The aforementioned records shall be entered into the Journal for submission to the College and for viva-voce. The total number of pages of the journal for the Module II **shall not be less than 15 and shall not exceed 20.**

Module III

Internship at lawyer's office

The student must obtain a **Certificate on the Letter Head** of the Advocate/ the law firm/solicitor/solicitor's firm/corporate office signed and stamped by the head/concerned authority/authorities, clearly indicating the *duration of internship which has to be a minimum of one month which must be strictly in the period from 1st July 2024 to 15th February 2025.* The pdf copy of the said certificate must be mailed by the student to the College by filling and submitting the google form through the following link and uploading the Certificate at the relevant portion in this google form: <https://forms.gle/An5ok3K2SpeconY1A>

The student is required to maintain a **DAILY DIARY** (diary containing records of the day-to-day work done at the advocate's office or the law firm along with the court attendance records during the period of internship. A brief report under this module shall be written by the student in the Journal and the said report shall essentially contain the following particulars: a. Name and Address of the Advocate/Advocates/Solicitor/Law Firm b. A brief account of the nature of matters undertaken by the law office including the courts/tribunals in which appearance is made by the advocates c. An overview of the work done by the student during the internship period d. Outcome that he/she has gained from the internship (a brief report of the various skills learnt during internship) The total number of pages of the journal for the Module II **shall not be less than 15 and shall not exceed 20.**

Module IV

4.1. Viva-Voce: It shall be based on Module II and Module III. For the viva-voce examination, the student must carry the following:

1. The Practical Training –III Journal
2. Internship Certificate (Hard Copy)
3. Daily Diary of Internship
- 4.2. Moot - Oral Submissions

{N.B. The journals shall be available in the College office on from 11.30 am to 12.30 pm only, against payment of Rupees One hundred (Rs.100/-) only.}
